- 1. Call to order
- 2. Approve minutes from September, 2018
  - a. Rebecca moved to approve, Larry seconded; minutes approved
- 3. Carol Morken and John Wilson (CLAS Advising) on APS about Probation changes
  - a. Faculty Assembly would like feedback from EPPC prior to November vote
  - b. See APS proposal regarding Academic Probation and Suspension for Undergraduates
  - c. See APS proposal justification
  - d. See letter of support from CLAS advising
    - i. Faculty Assembly and EPPC should review policy and suggested changes
    - ii. One plus from CLAS: Academic Success Packet switching to online module
    - iii. Concerns from CLAS:
      - 1. Timing of intervention may come too late—the new proposal has more meaningful intervention waiting until the second phase of academic probation
      - 2. New proposal lowers minimum GPA from 2.3 to 2.0 per semester (until cumulative is 2.0) the new proposal doesn't allow for students to show their progress and/or get off of probation as quickly
    - iv. Current probation: if cumulative GPA falls below 2.0, they move into Academic Probation, must complete an academic success plan, meet with the advisor before enrolling, and bring their next semester GPA up to 2.3
    - v. **EPPC Question:** Does the probation policy reflect poorly on the quality of education as perceived by prospective students? What is the difference between CU academic probation policy and the one at Metro?

**Class Answer:** Not sure this perspective has been directly addressed; don't have Metro's policy

**EPPC Question:** How does CU Denver's probation policy compare to CU Boulder and UCCS?

**CLAS Answer:** Boulder's is similar to current one here, but those students can keep taking classes in continuing ed to raise their GPA faster

**EPPC Question:** How are the different colleges addressing this?

**CLAS Answer:** The members representing the colleges on the Academic Success Committee are to be speaking with their deans, faculty, etc. for input

**EPPC Question:** Who decided we needed to review the current policy? What about the process that we have in place is not supporting student retention?

**CLAS Answer:** One proposal came from the School of Education, revolving around the academic success plan; and Academic Success and Advising Center had a follow-up proposal, so this is somewhat a combination of the two.

**EPPC Question:** We have anecdotal experience that students don't appreciate being designated as "in trouble" in the early alert system. Do advisors deal with this?

**CLAS Answer:** Students' perception of advising isn't necessarily the same as the faculty's – they have general advising and degree-specific faculty advising—students want a one-stop shop, rather than two layers. Students who complain are likely not as engaged in the campus yet

### vi. General Discussion:

- vii. Is there a mechanism in place for students who are further along in their degree and then drop down? If you've been borderline-2.0 for most of the time, you won't have enough time left in your degree to get the cumulative GPA back up
- viii. Making the alert/intervention earlier would help address some of these issues, help students know if/how they should drop a class—educating students how they take care of these issues on their own
- ix. Is throwing every resource at the students the best solution? Be more intentional with resource allocation

### 4. Any updates from committee members

- a. EPUS (Larry):
  - i. Discussing uniform grading (which letter grades will be used and what they mean, across the System)
  - ii. Retirement Survey results are out but haven't been shared with the committees yet

### 5. Faculty Assembly:

- a. Call for faculty participation: International Risk Management Committee
  - i. Looking at risk issues in the study abroad program (not sure if it includes Beijing program)
  - ii. See handout and pass onto Tod the names of anyone he can contact.
- b. Regents memo to Joanne Addison, Chair Faculty Council
  - i. Shared for EPPC's awareness
  - ii. Memo from the Regents concern for the state of civics in higher education
    - 1. Regents asking the faculty to evaluate curriculum regarding civics
    - 2. Some concern has been raised about the precedent this ask may set
- c. Campus Administrative Policy regarding Academic Integrity
  - i. Process and purpose
  - ii. Currently individual schools deal with academic integrity on their own (each school has its own process)

- iii. This APS would centralize this process for all academic integrity violations; student appeals would be heard and evaluated by a central unit (Jeff Franklin)
- iv. Being voted on by Faculty Assembly will probably come to us as an APS

#### 6. Other business

- a. Grade Forgiveness (Rebecca)
  - i. Policy has gone past the Provost, he made a couple of tweaks
  - ii. Executive Council: concerned that transfer students won't be able to take advantage of the policy since so many of them come in ready to take 3000-level classes
  - iii. Registrar Office raised concern that if we make a change to keep track of records for grade forgiveness purposes, that change may force a change across the whole System (Boulder, UCCS, Anschutz)

  - a. Rebecca motioned to approve, Jimmy seconded; minutes approved
- 3. Any updates from committee members
  - a. None
- 4. Faculty Assembly:
  - a. Faculty Assembly memo to Regent's regarding Civics concerns (Tod and Rebecca were on drafting committee)
    - i. Memo is drafted
    - ii. Speaks to existing strengths of our current programs
    - iii. Civics education is addressed in our GT Gen Ed curriculum
    - iv. Faculty do not want to mandate additional courses; foster student choice
    - v. Civics should be learned in context of existing courses
    - vi. Cost concerns
    - vii. EPPC Discussion:
      - 1. Will likely get feedback from other campuses, and System can respond
  - b. APS1025 Uniform Grade Policy Pass/Fail
    - i. No major concerns from Deans
    - ii. Tod shared some faculty concerns about students bringing back CH from study abroad programs
  - c. Fresh Start Program (a Sarah Fields initiative)
    - i. Arises when students have had bad academic performances, leave CU Denver, then come back later (in some cases, many years later)
    - ii. Can lead to students coming back with extremely low GPAs when they don't know about retroactive Withdrawals
    - iii. With the Fresh Start Program, when a student returns after a significant amount of time, their GPA is re-set.
      - 1. Courses would remain on the transcript, but they would not count toward the GPA

- 2. Students will need to have left for at least 2-5 years this timeline is still being discussed
- 3. Another question is equity with transfer students
- iv. May come back to us as a Policy to review
- 5. No updates on Academic Probation Initiative
- 6. Grade forgiveness
  - a. Went to Policy stage, where the Provost Office created a Policy; received input from Advisors; Provost updated and sent to Legal
    - In the meantime, Springs and Boulder showing interest; Boulder has initiative underway
  - b. How will we make this work in the System? Reconciling what we can students will have to declare before drop/add is over that this is a re-take class to trigger what needs to happen in IT within the automatic system
  - c. July of 2019 is timeline for when Policy will take effect

#### 7. Other business

a. Still have three colleges that do not have representation on EPPC; Tod will contact Deans looking for more members
